RESEARCH FLASH TALKS





We have a strong team and they will be working hard to best represent SIU in two weeks. The team coach and faculty advisor of Security Dawgs, Information Systems Technologies (IST) Associate Professor Tom Imboden, and is donating his CASA Teacher of the Year Award cash prize (\$500) to support the team to

compete in the regional CCDC. We appreciate his support and dedication to student success, and we wish the Security Dawgs team a great win in the Midwest Regional CCDC.

The School of Architecture was happy to help fund some of the costs of this event! Mr. Scott was very engaging with our students. I noticed how interested in them he was and that he gave them a lot of personal attention when speaking with them. Mr. Scott participated in review of fashion student work yesterday afternoon and he will return to campus later in the semester for the Fashion Show (April 27 mark your calendars!). Thank you, Siwon, for working to make this event possible! This type of learning and industry exposure is invaluable to our students!
- Since 2011, Fashion Design & Merchandising (FDM) and Interior Design (ID) students have worked together in a cooperative effort to incorporate their discipline expertise in developing

fashion brands. This year, the faculty has integrated the projects by including Jeffrey Scott Wright who operates *Jeffrey Scott Tights Guy* selling custom designed tights for men. Mr. Wright designs, manufactures, sells, and manages a small business all by himself. This former IT project manager is seeking a market opportunity for possible business expansion that will appeal to broader consumers.

On Wednesday March 1st, fashion merchandising students proposed three brands to Mr. Wright, which were developed as the 2st brand for *Jeffrey Scott Tights Guy*. 8-Bit Flex, Remnant, and Kritical Mass plan to carry apparel products influenced by gamer fashion targeting kidult consumers, but each brand presents unique brand images and different product styles. Mr. Wright was invited to campus and provided valuable comments on the presentations. He engaged further with students at a reception by giving personal attention pertinent to FDM and ID students. Mr. Wright said, "It was exciting to talk with the experts and see the fresh ideas from students. I absorbed information all day and learned about the art and science of fashion." Mr. Wright will come back on Thursday, April 27th to see the Brand Showcase presenting the outcome of five projects, including sample garments designed and produced by fashion design students, visual promotions created by fashion styling students, and pop-up stores designed by interior design students. Mr. Wright said, "I am looking forward to the next phase of the project! I'm excited to see the projects as they get more and more defined. I had told some of my industry friends about your project. I can't wait to give them all the details and share the great learning and collaborative environment SIU delivers to students and guests."

Faculty supervising the projects – now in its 7^a year – are Dr. **Siwon Cho**, Fashion Merchandising; Dr. **Laura Kidd**, Fashion Design; **Shelby Adkinson**, Fashion Styling; and **Laura Morthland**, Interior Design. Collaboration is extremely important in our daily teaching and research, as it offers diverse perspectives and skills with the development of higher-level thinking. It engages deeper learning, social skills, contextual understanding and levels of activity. Please join me in congratulating all the professors and students who participated in this great and innovative collaboration project!















SIU Dental Hygiene (DH) program had another successful "Give Kids a Smile Day" event last Friday, March 3, 2017. DH Students, faculty, and local dentists gave free checkups and cleanings to approximately 100 kids during this event. The service is offered once per year for children under age 16 who are without access to regular dental treatment. Some children received some dental treatment beyond the preventive care provided by our students that included x-rays, cleanings, fluoride treatments and pit and fissure sealants in addition to a dental exam. Jennifer Meyer, Assistant Instructor of Dental Hygiene, was the event Coordinator. STUDENT WEB DEVELOPMENT TEAM

Five senior Information Systems Technologies (IST) students comprise the SIU Student Web Development Team and will compete at the Association for Information Technology Professionals' (AITP) National Collegiate Conference and Career Fair (NCC) during April, 2017. The team members include team leader Lee Cooper, Cody Lingle, Ren Jing, Hallie Martin, and Matt Gross.

To prepare for the competition, these students work outside their regular class schedules to build a web application for a nonprofit group or organization. This year's project is a fully functioning web site for the Ascend RSO in the College of Business on the campus of SIUC. The project began in September, 2016, with deliverables throughout the fall and spring semesters. The project culminates with a formal presentation to be judged at the AITP NCC in St. Louis in April. Students are judged on a variety of criteria, but primarily their development process. This year's team is following the agile Scrum approach to manage the project.

In addition to the year-long web development project, students also compete in other events during the NCC, such as database design, security challenge, and others. Team member Cody Lingle won last year's Security Challenge. This will be the third year that an SIUC Student Web Development Team has competed in the AITP NCC. Three members, Lee Cooper, Cody Lingle, and Ren Jing competed on the 2015/2016 team. Both the project work and the NCC experience are great opportunities for students; e.g. last year Lee was offered a summer internship with a national company because of his participation. Additionally, it is an important recruiting opportunity to represent SIUC at a major conference.

The costs of competing at the AITP NCC are covered by donations. Students are required to have current AITP student memberships and to each pay a \$325 registration fee to attend the conference. Since some competitions run late into the evening, students and their advisor spend one night in a hotel. In addition, there are expenses for printing a professional poster for the competition, and nominal transportation and meal expenses. To take advantage of the reduced early registration fee, students hope to have full funds raised by March 15th. Through College of Applied Science and Arts support and individual donations, the team has raised most of the needed funds. However, they are still about \$700 short of covering all their expenses. BUDGET UPDATE

The "Grand Bargain" consists of 13 bills regarding the state budget. Five of them had been passed by the end of last month, but the remaining seven bills were not voted. We are again in a holding pattern. Gov. Rauner won't agree to an income-tax hike until he gets pro-business regulatory changes, a permanent property tax freeze, and term limits on political leaders. Although the "Grand Bargain" was derailed this past week, one of those bills passed on February 28 was SB0006, which covers various areas of making appropriations to agencies (including Illinois higher education) for costs incurred prior to July 1, 2017.

Within SB0006, page 31-32, Section 35 shows "The sum of \$93,403,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated from the Education Assistance Fund to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet its operational expenses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017." The complete text of SB0006 is available here: http://ilga.gov/legislation/100/SB/PDF/10000SB0006lv.pdf. Despite Senate approval, the SB0006 cannot become law unless accompanied by the dozen other bills in the Grand Bargain. The overall spending deal is on hold after Gov. Bruce Rauner voiced opposition to remaining parts of the plan.
