
CASA Dean's MMU (Monday Morning Update)

On Friday, April 7, 2017, the College of Applied Sciences and Arts Board of Counselors held a spring meeting in the SIU Transportation Education Center (TEC). Mr. Joseph Schuster was recognized as the 2016-2017 College of Applied Sciences and Arts Distinguished Alumni Award recipient, and Dr. Scott Collins was recognized as the 2017 E.J. and Mary C. Simon Distinguished Faculty Award recipient, right before the Board meeting.









2017 HONORS DAY

Honors Day at SIU Carbondale commemorates the accomplishments of the University's highest achieving students, those who have maintained a minimum grade point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale for both their total undergraduate studies at SIU Carbondale and their transfer credits. In our College, a total of 463 students met the minimum requirements: 47 Freshmen; 65 Sophomores; 71 Juniors, and 280 Seniors. Among these 463 students, 221 students maintain a GPA 3.75 or above, 97 students maintain a GPA 3.90 or above. Given the rigorous demands of our academic programs, these students are really outstanding. Moreover, 89 students were recognized for their scholarships and awards received from the College and individual departments.

This year's Honors Day ceremonies were held on Saturday, April 8, 2017. The University event started at 2:00pm in the SIU Student Center Ballrooms with remarks by Interim Chancellor Colwell and Mr. Dan G. Korte, SIU alumnus and Chief Executive Officer of LMI Aerospace, a leading supplier of structural solutions and engineering services to the commercial, business and regional, and military aerospace markets. The University event was followed by the College ceremony at 3:30pm in the Transportation Education Center (TEC). More than 100 students were recognized by Chairs, Directors, faculty, staff, families and friends. Mr. Ralph Tate, Associate Professor of Automotive Technology, was the Master of Ceremonies. The ceremony honored student achievement as well as the role faculty, staff, and alumni play in student success. Ms. Camelle Logan, President & CEO of Teaming Solution for Education and the President of the CASA Board of Counselors, introduced the 2016-17 ASA Distinguished Alumni Award recipient, Mr. Joseph Schuster. Associate Professor Richard McKinnies, the 2016 E.J. and Mary C. Simon Distinguished Faculty Award recipient introduced Professor Scott Collins, the 2017 E.J. and Mary C. Simon Distinguished Faculty Award recipient. Both Mr. Joseph Schuster and Professor Scott Collins delivered a touching and inspiring speech to the students who were honored on Saturday.

"Like anyone starting a new job," Mr. Schuster said, "I was a little apprehensive but quickly realized I was well prepared with the skills and knowledge needed to overcome the challenges encountered. The solid foundation of knowledge and skills were built from hand work, outstanding instruction, participation in class and various campus organizations." Dr. Scott Collins shared his experience and insight for success with the students and their family and friends. Through his inspiring talk, the audience, and I, had a better understanding of Marlon Wayans' words: "Success is not a destination, but the road that you're on. Being successful means that you're working hard and walking your walk every day. You can only live your dream by working hard towards it. That's living your dream."

Honors Day is a unique opportunity for the faculty and staff to express our great pride and deepest respect for the special accomplishments of our students. So many of our students excel inside and outside of the classroom, which makes them invaluable representatives of the College. It is truly a privilege for us to be an integral part on their path to personal growth and professional success.










The SIU Student Web Development Team finished in <u>Third place</u> in the AITP NCC Web Project Competition.




Congratulations!

• The SIU Aviation Flight (AF) program has been selected this year to participate in the Top Hawk program sponsored by industry leaders. The AF team picked up the custom-banded aircraft on Saturday, March 26, 2017 and are currently in Florida with the plane for our display at Sun & Fun – the second largest airshow in the nation after Oshkosh, and a prime recruiting venue. Just FYI, no state funds are being used for this recruiting trip or any of the others this spring. Congratulations!



• On Thursday, April 6, 2017, the SIU Board of Trustees approved the purchase of three Piper Arrow aircraft for the Aviation Flight (AF) program. This, along with February's approval of the purchase of five Cessna 172's, gives us all the approvals we need to move forward with placing purchase orders. In the days ahead we will be seeking financing for these purchases, which has been more prolonged than usual due to the state and University budget situation, but I have no doubt that we will eventually receive all of these aircraft that we have approval to purchase.

If, due to the budget situation, we must choose to purchase one type of aircraft now, and delay the purchase of the other until the University is in a better position, we will prioritize the Pipers over the Cessna's due mainly to the age of the RG fleet and the maintenance and costs associated with keeping these older aircraft in an airworthy status. This decision was made in consultation with the leadership of the flight program. The forecast for delivery (of the Arrows) at this point is November-December 2017. It will be very cool having these Piper aircraft at SIU! Congratulations!

• SIU Dental Hygiene Seniors participated in SIU's Big Event/Day of Service on April 1 by providing oral cancer and oral health screenings for the residents at Mill Street Towers in Carbondale. A total of 28 residents received screenings and benefited from three informational tables: oral health information, flavored water samples and healthy snack information, and smoking cessation information. The Mill Street Tower's Service Coordinator was extremely pleased with the services provided and professionalism of the SIU DH students and would like to have us back. MONETARY AWARD PROGRAM (MAP) GRANT

MAP provides grants, which do not need to be repaid, to Illinois residents who attend in-state colleges and demonstrate financial need, based on the information provided on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). MAP grants can be applied only toward tuition and mandatory fees. Illinois is currently without a budget or a final MAP appropriation for Fiscal Years 2017 and 2018. The following chart shows the total MAP eligibility and funding history:

As you can see from the chart above, MAP is significantly underfunded, especially during the last two years. The state has only been able to offer MAP grants to less than half the students who are eligible. About 150,000 students each year have been turned away. The dollar amount of funding for MAP has been relatively flat since 2002, while the volume of eligible students has increased by over 100,000, a 50% increase. For FY 16, funding for the second half of the 2015-16 school year was not appropriated until the end of June, after the school year had ended. To date, no funding has yet been approved to pay for FY 17 MAP grants for the current school year.
