During the SIU Day of Giving on Wednesday, March 7, 2018, CASA raised \$12,421 from 306 gifts! Among 28 participating units of the University, our College had the highest number of participants in the one-day fundraising event. Our College's participation increased by 170 percent (170%), and the total raised increased by 31.96% compared to last year. On behalf of the College, I would like to thank you for helping to make this year's Day of Giving a great success.

As CASA faculty and staff, we invest our time and talent into the College and our students every day. When we extend our contributions to include philanthropy, we express our belief in the College's mission and actively support our long-standing culture of excellence. Chairs/directors and administrative staff in CASA played a critical role in our Day of Giving success as leaders and organizers of "giving desks" and individual events. They are some of the College's greatest advocates, actively promoting our values, supporting our mission, and making CASA a great place to work and to learn. Our alumni, faculty, and staff donated at various levels. As we always say, no gift is too small (or too big), and it is your participation that is important!

Especially, I would like to thank Scott Collins and all SAH faculty, staff, and students for their great contributions: SAH alone had 150 gifts, almost half of the total gifts for the College!

Follow the wooden paths from the reception to find a welcoming atmosphere filled with elements of nature and space to gather and interact with the community.





• Chris Micha, Automotive Technology Industrial Board Co-Chair from Fiat Chrysler Automobiles, has worked closely with ICT to develop the Qlikview-based SQDF (Service & Quality Data Feed) and has been the lead voice in the efforts of building an SQDF Alert Dashboard. He continues to challenge the status quo and pushes the organization to incorporate enhancements to the SQDF database/tools for better, faster, data. The SQDF Qlikview tool was developed to allow Engineering and Quality to quickly identify emerging/growing issues and start the investigation/triage work for quick issue resolution. In addition, an SQDF Alert Dashboard, using data analytics, was developed to provide early issue alerts. The current average cost avoidance estimate from this tool is about \$900,000 to \$1.8M yearly, generating about 5 to 10 new SQDF Global Issue Management issues (GIMs) every month. DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IN CLASSROOMS

How do we promote diversity and inclusion in classrooms? Prof. Monica Linden (Neuroscience, Brown University) created a "Diversity and Inclusion Statement" in her syllabus, as quoted below.

Monica Linden: In an ideal world, science would be objective. However, much of science is subjective and is historically built on a small subset of privileged voices. In this class, we will make an effort to read

papers from a diverse group of scientists, but limits still exist on this diversity. I acknowledge that it is possible that there may be both overt and covert biases in the material due to the lens with which it was written, even though the material is primarily of a scientific nature. Integrating a diverse set of experiences is important for a more comprehensive understanding of science. I would like to discuss issues of diversity in neuroscience as part of the course from time to time.

Please contact me (in person or electronically) or submit anonymous feedback if you have any suggestions to improve the quality of the course materials.

Furthermore, I would like to create a learning environment for my students that supports a diversity of thoughts, perspectives and experiences, and honors your identities (including race, gender, class, sexuality, religion, ability, etc.) To help accomplish this:

If you have a name and/or set of pronouns that differ from those that appear in your official Brown records, please let me know!

If you feel like your performance in the class is being impacted by your experiences outside of class, please don't hesitate to come and talk with me. I want to be a resource for you. Remember that you can also submit anonymous feedback (which will lead to me making a general announcement to the class, if necessary to address your concerns). If you prefer to speak with someone outside of the course, the Associate Dean of the College for Diversity Programs is an excellent resource.

I (like many people) am still in the process of learning about diverse perspectives and identities. If something was said in class (by anyone) that made you feel uncomfortable, please talk to me about it. (Again, anonymous feedback is always an option.)

As a participant in course discussions, you should also strive to honor the diversity of your classmates. Versions of this statement were used in her neuroscience classes including a large (>100 students) lecture class on neural systems, a mid-sized (~35 student) lecture class on the neurobiology of learning and memory, and a small (17 student) senior-level seminar about the amygdala. Student feedback was immediately positive. Students complimented the statement, and for Monica, this invitation to talk with her opened up lines of communication in a way that she had not experienced before. Krishnan, now a graduate student in biology at Berkeley, used a similar statement in their lab section.
