CASA Dean's MMU (Monday Morning Update)

A Tradition of Excellence, A Standard of Success

Monday, November 12, 2018

Dear Colleagues,

Spring course registration started ten days ago. This is a critical time to retain our first-year students who are freshmen or new transfer students. There are a total of 235 new students in our College this semester. As of last Friday, fifty-seven percent (57%) of CASA first-year new students had registered their 2019 Spring classes. This means 43% of our new students have NOT registered yet. The table below shows the distribution of these students among academic units in the College:

The goal of the College is, within the next five weeks, to have at least 90% of our first-year new students complete their spring registration before they leave for the winter holiday. Let us work together to meet this goal; this clearly requires everyone's effort. If you are a faculty member, please use a few minutes in each class to encourage students to register for their Spring classes as soon as possible. If you are an academic advisor, please provide the RUN numbers to students on a timely basis and schedule your advising meetings with students before they leave for the winter holiday.

There are more than 25 various kinds of holds preventing students from registering. For instance, if a student's bursar account currently has more than \$200 past due, this student will have a "Bursar Hold"

(BR). The Registrar webpage at https://registrar.siu.edu/luminis/holdshelp.php contains a list of hold codes and how to remove the holds. Currently, there are more than 1,000 registration holds for all CASA students, and we are looking for different ways to help remove these roadblocks for our students.

One way is to pair an Academic Associate (AA) with students to provide timely help. An AA is a junior or senior student in CASA who serves as a resource to new students and a bridge between students and the administration. AAs collect comments, concerns, and questions from students, provide answers if possible, and relay them to the College administrative staff to take appropriate action. The AA Initiative is to serve as an integral part of the College's effort to improve retention and graduation rates. It was designed to give new students both a sense of belonging and the confidence of knowing that there is someone to whom they can turn for help during the first year of their college life at SIUC. When new students have problems, they are far more likely to discuss them with their peers or friends rather than their Chairs, Directors, or Dean's Office staff. AAs are students who will be trained to recognize when their peers may have a problem, listen to fellow students confidentially and assist them with emotional, societal, or academic struggles. The CASA AA team is currently testing a chatbot called "Ask CASA" designed to help new students. This virtual agent uses artificial intelligence to understand students and mimic a conversation with students through a messaging or voice interface. The current version of this chatbot can answer approximately 500 commonly asked questions about academics, campus life, and student support services. We plan to deploy this "Ask CASA" virtual agent on December 1st, 2018. We hope it will provide 24/7 services to our students wherever and whenever they need them. From the time students are accepted to the College, they can be welcomed by "Ask CASA," invited to attend an orientation, and guided through the process of financial aid and course registration.

Students who feel a connection to their campus are more likely to fit in and want to remain at the school. Our retention efforts focus on fostering these student connections through caring faculty and staff, various school events, conversation with Academic Associates, personalized advising, Saluki Cares, and so on. The retention rate for first-year students in the U.S. is about 68%, according to a report by ACT. We would like our College's first year retention rate to be at least 90%. Let's work together to achieve our goal. Thank you.

• Please join me in congratulating Mr. **Shannon Kraus** for being selected as the 2019 CASA Distinguished Alumni Award winner! Many thanks go to John Dobbins, Interim Director of School of Architecture, for his nomination and recommendation. The CASA Board of Counselors met on Thursday, October 11, 2018, and selected Shannon to receive this year's award.

Mr. Kraus is Executive Vice President, Principal, and Managing Director of HKS, Inc., a large architecture firm in Washington, DC with approximately 240 employees. Mr. Kraus is a 1995

graduate of SIUC majored in Architectural Studies, and he also earned an Associate of Applied Science degree from SIUC in 1992.

His professional accomplishments are numerous. He was a leader while in college, served as an officer in our chapter of the American Institute of Architecture Students and was selected to be a national vice president of the organization in 1995-1996. For the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB), Mr. Kraus served as President of the NAAB 2014-2015, and as President-Elect 2013-2014. He served on 12 separate accreditation visits in the US and at two international schools from 1997 to 2017.

Mr. Kraus has given his time in community service, too. He helped create the HKS Design Fellowship, served on the Dean's Advisory Committee at the University of Texas at Arlington, and he has worked with the Make-A-Wish Foundation multiple times in the last 18 years. Mr. Kraus received many honors and awards, to name just a few:

- He was chosen as one of Building Design and Construction's "40 under 40" in 2008. These
 are the forty emerging professionals to watch in the design and construction industries
 within the United States.
- He received the AIA (American Institute of Architects) Young Architect Award in 2006.
 This is an award given nationally by the AIA to a select few architects.
- o He was chosen for the TSA William Caudill Young Architect Award in 2005.

Mr. Kraus has published more than 20 articles in his career. He focuses on two main areas: healthcare design and the internship/licensure process for young architects. He was also published by the AIA in its "Handbook for Professional Practice" in 2012. This is the leading publication on the business and legal aspects of practicing architecture in the US. There are 50 listings of presentations and design juries on his vita. He has been the keynote speaker at 12 national and regional meetings and conventions, and he gave a TEDx talk in 2017 entitled "Where We Live Impacts How We Live." We are expecting Mr. Kraus' speech during our 2019 Honors Day.
