Dear Colleagues,

While we are waiting for the official 10-day enrollment report, which will be available later this week, I would like to share some unofficial and preliminary enrollment data for the second week of classes. As of September 2, 2019, as you can see from the graph below, the total number of students in CASA this Fall semester is increased by 0.64% compared to the 2018 Fall semester (from 2493 to 2509), even though we had a large graduation class of 513 students in May of this year. Many of our students start their classes late - for instance, some students and courses in CASA start in October this semester. Moreover, our new transfer students increased 4.64%, from 366 to 383, and our first-time first-year (FTFY, a student who has no prior postsecondary experience attending an institution for the first time at the undergraduate level) new students increased 27.75%, from 209 to 267! Our graduate level enrollment is excellent as well: The total graduate students in CASA is 2,509, which is an approximately 0.64% increase compared to Fall 2018.

As usual, our off-campus programs are continuing to grow. As shown in the following diagram, the total enrollment of CASA off-campus programs increased 1.88%, while new undergraduate off-campus enrollment increased 7.74%, and total graduate off-campus students increased 2.63%%.

SIU SYSTEM COLLABORATIVE GRANTS

The goal of the SIU System Collaboration Grant program is to promote new biomedical research collaborations between faculty within SIU School of Medicine, SIU Edwardsville, and SIU Carbondale. To qualify as a new team (co-PIs), faculty may not have previously published together as co-authors or worked together previously on internal or external grants or grant submissions. Faculty from at least two campuses must be represented on the team. Each faculty member must have a well-defined and meaningful role on the project. It is expected that one proposal will be funded. Total available funding will be \$20,000 if two campuses are represented and \$30,000 if all three campuses are represented.

A budget for each represented campus up to \$10,000 must be submitted. The budgets need not be identical but must be tailored to the amount and type of work to be performed on each campus.

All applications must be submitted as a single pdf file to the office of the Associate Dean of Research at SIUSOM (kkatcher@siumed.edu). Application forms are available at
