CASA Dean's MMU (Monday Morning Update)

Dear Colleagues,

The Department of Aviation Technologies (AVT) celebrated its 50's anniversary last week. On Saturday evening, about 200 AVT alumni, friends, faculty, staff and students gathered in the Transportation Education Center (TEC) to celebrate their collective achievements, reflect on their founding years and reminisce about their evolution. Mr. Lewis Russell, a former AVT chair, and Mr. Dick Cannon, retired AVT professor, recalled many memories about the early days of the AVT Department and generated a lot of laughter among the audience. I was very delighted to be there and help mark such a major milestone in the history of the College of Applied Sciences and Arts.

During its 50-year history, AVT has experienced many achievements and transformations. The department offers baccalaureate degrees in aviation maintenance technology with specializations in advanced aircraft maintenance, helicopter maintenance and avionics. The program serves approximately 170 students at SIU's Carbondale Illinois campus. The FAA Approved program prepares students to enter the workforce as certified aircraft technicians, avionics technicians, helicopter mechanics, product support engineers, jet engine mechanics, and many other highly technical fields. Graduates of the program are in extremely high demand and are recruited heavily by local companies such as Boeing, GE Aerospace, Jet Aviation, West Star Aviation, and United Airlines, among others.

The SIU Department of Aviation Technologies is the only FAA approved aircraft maintenance technology program at a public university in the state of Illinois and the only university in the world with a Bell Helicopter approved helicopter maintenance training program. The AVT program is considered one of the best in the nation. The program consistently maintains a 100% student pass rate on national certification exams, which far outpaces the national norm, and places SIU at the top of the ranking. The Aviation Technologies student Aerobatic Team won the International Aerobatic Club (IAC) Collegiate Team Championship six out of the seven years that they competed, beating teams from all the major aviation universities including the U.S. Air Force Academy, Embry Riddle and University of North Dakota. Another aviation technologies student organization, The Rotor and Wing Association of America has been inducted into the Illinois Aviation Hall of Fame.

We are celebrating not only AVT today, but the entire aviation and CASA family; and the gathering last Saturday was a tangible manifestation of that fact. We have built an extensive community of alumni, academics, partners, supporters, friends and many others. Without doubt, it is through our collective efforts and support that AVT has withstood the test of time, and that AVT has been able to grow and develop over the past five decades. On behalf of the College, I thank the AVT faculty and staff for their dedication, contribution, and support!

What AVT has done in its first 50 years is incredible, but where could it go and what can it do in the next 50 years? Chair Mike Burgener and the AVT faculty are developing new specializations, new distance education courses, and a new UAS (Unmanned Aircraft Systems, i.e., drones) course to be offered next May. Over the past three years, AVT has been awarded grants from Boeing totaling more than \$300,000. The new Test Cell Building provides new labs and a research facility for engine testing and fuel

efficiency research. New programs and new research activities will help the AVT department improve its quality, strengthen its reputation, and heighten its visibility.

Laursen Award on Friday, October 9, 2015 at the UAA (University Aviation Association) Awards Banquet during the 2015 UAA Fall Education Conference. The Captain V.L. Laursen Award is a national award in recognition of teaching excellence and outstanding contributions to aviation education. The award honors former Trans World Airline Captain Vern L. Laursen, a highly respected member of the airline industry whose expertise and knowledge are well known throughout the aviation community. Captain Laursen made significant contributions in the areas of flight training, equipment, and procedures. He is renowned for his technical and administrative abilities in evaluating flight simulator and visual system applications. Please join me in congratulating the Health Care Management (HCM) program on hosting a very successful annual External Advisory Board (EAB) meeting on Tuesday, November 3^{ed}, 2015. The meeting was well attended by administration, faculty, staff, health care executives, and HCM students. Discussions on a non-transcriptable professional development series were held in which EAB members provided topic areas they would like to see offered. Board members discussed the status of the Master of Health Administration / Masters of Health Informatics (MHA/MHI) and indicated that providing those programs are approved they would all like to serve on the EAB for those programs as well as continue on the undergraduate program EAB. The annual program assessment was reported and Board members provided suggestions on updating the strategic planning, community/population health, and coding portions of the HCM curriculum. There was also discussion on integrating clinical knowledge, e.g., SOAP notes, into the Managerial Epidemiology course, given health care managers need an understanding of clinical documentation and processes even if they aren't clinically licensed. HCM students gave presentations to the Board on material they have learned in HCM 390 – Human Resources and Labor Relations course. Topics included Doctors and Competency Exams, Gender Gaps in Salary, Resilience Training, Employee Engagement Programs, Generational Issues/Diversity and Inclusion, and Increasing the Number of Women in the C-suite. Board members overwhelmingly enjoyed the exercise and want to continue this practice in the future and students were given the unique opportunity to receive thoughtful critique from field executives on how to improve their presentation skills. Executives also commented that they were pleased to see such up-to-date and relevant information being covered in the curriculum. I would like to extend a special thank-you

FY15 PUBLIC UNIVERSITY REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

For fiscal year 2015, Illinois public universities reported revenue and expenditures of \$6.9 billion. University income funds (i.e. tuition revenue) represent the largest overall source of revenue for public universities at 27.4 percent, followed by State appropriated funds at 17.5 percent. The largest overall expenditure by function is for instructional programs, which represented \$1.76 billion or 25.3 percent of expenditures from all fund sources. Expenditures from total funds under the executive management category is \$70.8 million, 4.5 percent less than in fiscal year 2014.
