Dear Colleagues,

The MMU will have one more publication this year: December 11, 2017.

The Thanksgiving holiday this year starts Thursday, 11/23/2017. It is the time of year to reflect on the blessings in our lives and the things for which we are grateful. I'm grateful to be part of the CASA family, with diverse opinions but a shared goal of student success. This has been especially apparent in this year's ASA Multidisciplinary Research Symposium, where diverse research results and creative ideas were presented and exchanged. I'm thankful for our remarkable faculty who change student's lives through teaching, research, and service. It makes me proud to know that our College's peer-reviewed journal, Journal of Applied Sciences and Arts (JASA) which was started 1.5 years ago through OpenSIUC at http://opensiuc.lib.siu.edu/jasa/, had a total of 880 downloads last year, and the readers come from all over the world, as indicated by the picture below.



I'm thankful for all of you who help our students both in and outside the classroom. Recently we started a recruitment calling campaign, and our faculty volunteers, chairs/directors, and academic advisors are contacting students who have expressed interest in our programs but have not yet applied. I believe our

outreach efforts will cause a significant jump in application numbers and eventually drive an enrollment increase in the Fall 2018 semester. The purpose of this calling campaign is to get students excited about SIU. CASA has very unique programs that provide employable skills in many strong industries. Let's work together to share our enthusiasm for our programs and our University.

I'm thankful for our alumni, friends, and donors, to whom we owe our sincere thanks for their support. Last Friday, two aviation departments had a joint naming ceremony for a TEC conference room (126A) and an appreciation reception to say thank-you to donors for their contribution to our ADS-B and aircraft fleet upgrade campaign. Collectively we raised nearly \$300,000 last year for aircraft equipment upgrade to be in compliance with FAA requirements before 2020. These donors have given not only their money but their time, passion, and continuous support to keep our programs strong. Recently three programs in our College had their industrial advisory committee meetings: Automotive Technology (AUT), Health Care Management (HCM), and Aviation (AF, AVM, and AVT). Many industry leaders came to talk to our students, faculty, and staff to help ensure that our programs are relevant and effective and to strengthen our ties to industry members. Ask these industry leaders why they travel long distances and pay their own way to spend two days every year to support us, and the answer is almost always the same because they believe in our mission and are thankful for what CASA has done for them and their industries.

As we pause to celebrate the traditional American holiday of Thanksgiving this year, please know your hard work and your contributions to the College's success are foremost in my mind. CASA has had an eight percent (8%) increase in enrollment from 2013 to 2016, a twenty-two percent (22%) increase in graduate program enrollment, and more than thirty percent (30%) DE revenue generation for the whole University - we have so many things to celebrate. You make the College so successful and so special; and for that, I am grateful.



FOREIGN LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT

Is Computer Science a foreign language? Georgia says yes. Since the fall of 2014, high school students have been able to take computer science classes, where they learn programming languages like Java or Python, in place of foreign language classes like French or Spanish. It really helped the state come up with the strategy to boost enrollment in high school computer science classes. The University System of Georgia (USG) changed its college entrance requirements to support the change. Statewide, since the USG shifted its policy and the state board of education put more emphasis on hiring computer science teachers, the number of students taking computer science classes has grown by more than 50 percent (50%). 
SIU EXCELLENCE AWARD

FUTURE OF HIGHER ED

Harvard Business School professor Clayton Christensen said that half of American colleges will be bankrupt in 10-15 years (https://tinyurl.com/ycsg68kd). In his recent book, "The Innovative University," Christensen and co-author Henry Eyring analyze the future of traditional universities, and conclude that online education will become a more cost-effective way for students to receive an education, effectively undermining the business models of traditional institutions and running them out of business.

On the other hand, there is another way the college "bubble" ends (https://tinyurl.com/y73ppmkp). For the past few decades, the unstoppable increase in college tuition has been a fact of life, like death and taxes. The sticker price of American college increased nearly 400 percent in the last 30 years, while median household income growth was relatively flat. Student debt soared to more than \$1 trillion, the result of loans to cover the difference. The college pipeline is drying up, and there are too many colleges.
