If you are looking for a new research topic, below is a list of *call for solutions* from Leading Edge Only. I highlighted the third item, which is related to both aviation and architecture.

“We are currently working with a leading equipment manufacturer to find innovations in construction equipment. Our client is seeking to engage with SMEs, Universities, Entrepreneurs and other organizations that have innovative solutions in response to the four challenges below. The solutions can be at any stage of development.”

1. [Use of construction equipment for the waste and recycling sector](#) – The need is for construction equipment that can clear waste sites. This can be a stand-alone piece of equipment or an attachment.
2. [Innovative attachment for construction equipment](#) – The innovation will extend the market reach into sectors such as agriculture and mining.
3. [Use of drone/UAV technology in the construction and mining sector](#) – The innovation must allow safe remote access to carry out inspections and/or other tasks in areas that are hard or dangerous to reach. It must be able to operate in conditions which are dark/dusty/hot.
4. [Creating a high precision, low-cost Local Positioning System \(LPS\)](#) – The innovation must allow for location identification and monitoring of the position.

SCHOLARSHIP INTERVIEW WEEKEND

Around 50 high-achieving students and their family members visited our College on Friday and Saturday, Feb. 2 and 3, for the Chancellor's and University Excellence Scholarship Interview Weekend. On Friday

evening, the College hosted a welcome event at the Quigley Gallery. Faculty and staff members talked with these students and offered tours and showcases about individual programs. These students have received the Dean's scholarship already, and they were competing for the 25 Chancellor's Scholarships, which cover tuition, fees and room and board for four years, and a larger number of University Excellence Scholarships, which is a \$9,500 award for four years. New this year, the University will also be offering Chancellor Transfer Scholarships and University Excellence Scholarships. SIU will award five Chancellor Transfer Scholarships, which cover tuition and fees for two years, and 50 University Excellence Transfer Scholarships, which is a \$9,500 award for two years.

CONGRATULATIONS

- CASA's history traces back to June of 1950, when President Delyte Morris appointed Ernest J. Simon as SIU Director of the Technical Institute and Associate Director of Adult Education. The most prestigious award in CASA, the E.J. and Mary C. Simon Distinguished Faculty Award, this year goes to **Dr. Thomas Shaw**, Associate Professor of Health Care Management (HCM) in the School of Allied Health (SAH). Congratulations!

The award is intended to acknowledge, celebrate and reward extraordinary lifetime achievement with respect to teaching and other activities directly related to the education and general welfare of students of the College of Applied Sciences and Arts (CASA). This is the top faculty award in our College. The recipient receives \$5,000 and a plaque, and makes a speech at the annual *CASA Honors Day Ceremony*.

Dr. Shaw has been an exemplary Faculty member in the School of Allied Health (formerly known as Department of Health Care Professions) since 1995. His role as an educator predominantly involved Mortuary Science and Funeral Services (MSFS). However, he began teaching courses in the Health Care Management (HCM) program several years ago. Teaching in both the MSFS and HCM programs has provided Dr. Shaw with the opportunity to teach in both clinical and management environments, as well as the traditional on-campus, online, and military based formats. He is a versatile and well-rounded educator who holds students to a high standard while assuring he is there to assist them in attaining their academic goals. Recently Dr. Shaw formally joined the HCM program as a full-time Faculty member. He has entered this new role with excitement and curiosity and has already made impactful and thoughtful suggestions to advance HCM's undergraduate and graduate education.

From 2015 to 2017, Dr. Shaw was CASA's Associate Dean for Administration. He provided strong leadership in developing and administering programs, especially in off-campus and online programs, to promote a high quality undergraduate and graduate experience. During his tenure as

Associate Dean, Dr. Shaw was a principal advocate for the College, helping formulate and implement college policies and strategic plans. He is committed to collaborative, ethical leadership, and he is skilled in data analytics and financial resource management, as well as strategic planning.

Ernest .J. Simon was founding dean of the College from its inception in 1951 until his retirement in 1970, and both he and his wife, Mary C. Simon, remained strong supporters of the University and CASA. This award recognizes the overall accomplishments of a faculty member in support of his or her respective program and can be received only once in a lifetime. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all nominators and the E.J. and Mary C. Simon Distinguished Faculty Award Selection Committee for their diligent work and service.


- Dr. **Seung-Hee Lee**, Professor of Fashion Design & Merchandising, has a new co-authored paper accepted for publication:



- Please join me in congratulating **Laura Morthland**, Associate Professor and Interior Design Program Director, and **Caitlyn Cathcart**, Senior Student in Interior Design (ID), for being selected as semi-finalist in the 2017 National Steelcase Student Design Competition (NEXT)! Caitlyn will travel to Grand Rapids Michigan to present her project along with the other semi-finalists next month.

In this year's NEXT competition, which is the fifth year of this competition, there are more than 800 students and 65 programs participating in the competition. The panel of judges independently reviewed entries the past few weeks and spent two days together in Dallas this week to make their final decisions. As a reminder of their anonymous judging process, each professor submitted two submissions from their independently instructed class to a third party consultant in California via an

external gmail account. This consultant renames entries using a random number/letter code (ie: 14N or 71S) and then distributes submissions via Google Drive and ensures each judge receives a mix of programs to review. Judges score entries individually and then meet face to face to review. Each judge presents their pool of entries to the other judges and all judges vote after each review. This review process is inclusive of reviewing entries, voting/re-voting and debating amongst the judges to align on the five semifinalist and five honorable mention projects against the program criteria. Once that process is completed and all judges are aligned on the final scoring, project identification codes are documented and only then are the names of the students and their corresponding programs revealed.

YOUNG PROFESSIONAL

Ribich builds life of work, play and volunteering

Rachel Ribich, a 2011 graduate of Southern Illinois University in Carbondale (and a Chicago native), has been making waves since arriving in Colorado Springs in 2015. The one-time interior design major is now marketing manager for Colorado Springs' Nunn Construction, which also has a remote office in Cortez.

Ribich, 28, spoke with the Business Journal about her work and play in the Pikes Peak region.

Talk about your background.

After graduation, I immediately started working in the design industry in [Chicago's] downtown. I started working at the Merchandise Mart, which is a big furniture design center. Then I worked for a commercial furniture company for five years in the city. While I was working with them, I started transitioning into the marketing role ... creating proposals to win different jobs.

What brought you to Colorado Springs?

I was ready for a smaller city. I was ready to be more immersed in nature. In southern Illinois, it's beautiful down there. Most people don't know the southern tip of Illinois is gorgeous. There's a state park, a national forest ... so I spent a lot of

to stay in Colorado Springs as much as possible.

Most of our work is negotiated. Primarily, we foster that relationship up front then propose on the project. Then we typically go to an interview process. My primary focus is creating these presentations and proposals that put us in a really great position to win the work. Putting that hard copy in front of someone really puts that first impression of our company up front.

How are you furthering your leadership skills?

I just finished up a class through Leadership Pikes Peak, LNOW, [which ran] from August to December. It was a group of 25 young professionals who went through the program. It was intense. ... I was supported through the company to take the program.

It was all about civic engagement and we met once a week — in the evenings, at different places in the community. We met at nonprofits, City Hall, the Pioneers Museum ... all these different locations around town where we just learned about what's going on in our community and how we can get involved as young professionals ... volunteering our time or becoming more engaged in politics — all those kinds of things. Also, within that program we branched out into smaller groups where we were paired with a nonprofit. I worked with Palmer Land Trust, where I got people more engaged with land conservation through social media, events and planning. It was a great learning experience.

Where do you volunteer?

Volunteering is how I spend my free time if I'm not hiking, rock climbing or being out in nature.


- **David L. Finnigan**, a Master of Architecture student at SIUC, has recently published an in-depth architectural history book on Robert Allerton Park, 1,500-acre country estate with formal gardens and stately home, located in central Illinois. Congratulations!

Inside Allerton: The Essential Guide to Robert Allerton Park offers a historical narrative of the entire park, including the woodland trails, formal gardens and statuary, and main house. It is 128 pages, and extensively researched with much new information about the estate that has never before been published.

Robert Allerton was a Chicago art collector and philanthropist, a major patron and benefactor to the Art Institute of Chicago. He was son of Samuel Allerton, who helped found the First National Bank of Chicago and the Chicago Union Stockyards.

The book is richly illustrated with over 240 images: the author's own color photography, as well as archival photographs (21 in color), and over a dozen original architect's drawings. The book is available now. The publisher is G.S. Brenac. It is hardcover, \$34.99 retail. It can be ordered at Barnes & Noble, Amazon.com, and many other booksellers.
