CASA Dean's MMU (Monday Morning Update)

A Tradition of Excellence, A Standard of Success

Dear Colleagues,

The 2019 Fall Commencement was held at the SIU Banterra Center last Saturday, December 14, 2019, with Saluki graduates, family members, and friends gathered to celebrate their accomplishments and milestones. At this graduation ceremony, the College of Applied Sciences and Arts graduated a total of 521 students. SIU Carbondale graduated a total of 1,793 students, including bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees awarded in the Summer and Fall 2019, as indicated in the following table.

The number of graduating students from CASA (521) is **29.06%** of the overall SIUC graduating students (1,793) who received their diplomas last Saturday. Among the 521 graduates from CASA, 350 received bachelor's degrees, 120 received master's degrees, and 51 received associate degrees. CASA is not only graduating students in quantity, but also with high quality. During this Commencement, more than 112 CASA students wore special medallions and honor cords reflecting significant academic achievements earned. Among these 112 students earning recognition, 63 received *Cum Laude* distinction, signifying a

cumulative GPA of 3.5 to 3.749; 38 received *Magna Cum Laude* distinction, signifying a cumulative GPA of 3.75 to 3.899; and 11 students received *Summa Cum Laude* distinction, carrying a cumulative GPA of 3.9 to 4.0. There were also several students in the University Honors Program who maintained an average GPA of 3.3 or better, and 56 students received multiple degrees. It is the hard-working students and dedicated faculty in the College of Applied Sciences and Arts who have made this happen. Thank you for making CASA programs successful.

I would like to acknowledge the extraordinary efforts of many dedicated faculty and staff members who have contributed to this special occasion for our students and their families. Your participation represents our commitment to educating the leaders of tomorrow, and is especially appreciated by our students and their families who travelled to witness the culmination of years of commitment and hard work. 2020 SPRING & FALL REGISTRATION

Registration for Spring 2020 classes started October 29, 2019, and is open until January 19, 2020. As of last Monday (December 9, 2019), CASA had a total enrollment of 1,890 for Spring 2020, a 2.5% increase compared to the same week last year.

For the Fall 2020 semester, the application and admission numbers are looking great too. There are 36 weeks before the first day of classes in the Fall 2020 semester. The 36-week report shows that CASA's applications increased 25% and admissions increased 19%, compared to the respective numbers last year.

FINAL GRADE SUBMISSION

I am sure you have received email reminders of submitting your final course grades via SalukiNet prior to Wednesday, December 18. We have a goal to be 100% compliant with the University final grade submission policy. Official grade submission is done using Self-Service Banner (SSB) after logging into SalukiNet. Please submit your grades as soon as possible, but no later than 8:00 AM on Wednesday, December 18, 2019. Any final grades not submitted by then will result in a "not recorded" (*NR*) grade being entered by the Records staff later that morning for each affected student. To give such affected students their proper grades, you will then need to complete and send to my office an official grade change card for each affected student.

You can check within SalukiNet the status of any still-missing SSB grades by launching the *Must Do List* task. This additional verification will hopefully help you avoid having to deal with *NR* grades and the

As SIU President Delyte Morris set forth to develop a unique venture in higher education, and to develop a college/institute of industry and career focused programs, the Vocational Technical Institute (VTI) at SIU was born in the early 1950s.

As VTI began in 1952, both President Delyte Morris and VTI Director Ernest Simon searched to bring together a group of faculty and staff that could persevere against continual barriers and obstacles placed in front of them. Two individuals recruited were Duncan and Wilma Lampman. Duncan taught in the Machine Drafting and Design Technology program and Wilma became the first Librarian for the VTI campus in Carterville.

Like everything at VTI, the programs and library started with nothing. The facilities were dilapidated, abandoned, former military buildings located on a separate campus in Carterville, IL. Through hard work, they created the largest College at SIU.

The Lampman's helped infuse VTI with the spirit of teamwork and perseverance to provide students with the best education possible. They did what was necessary to overcome the barriers in front of them. As the Automotive Technology program became the first-degree program in VTI and further evolved into a world class program, the Lampman's recognized that unique culture. Upon their retirement, they created an endowed scholarship in the program to recognize students that display this same spirit.

Now celebrating her 98th birthday, Wilma Lampman (VTI's first Librarian) continues her tireless support of students, faculty and staff in the VTI/College of Applied Sciences and Arts.





CONGRATULATIONS

On Friday, December 13, 2019 at 7:00 pm, SIU hosted an Academic Excellence Recognition Ceremony in Ballroom D of the Student Center. This program recognized those 2019 Fall graduating seniors with Latin Honors. The undergraduate student's degree honors designation is determined by the cumulative GPA calculated by Southern Illinois University from all undergraduate career work, including work transferred from other institutions. Latin honors are phrases used to indicate the level of academic distinction with which an academic degree was earned. There are three types of Latin honors. In order of increasing level of honor, they are: Cum Laude, Magna Cum Laude, and Summa Cum Laude. Thirty-one (31) CASA students and their families and friends participated in the ceremony.

Among the 31 students earning recognition, 21 received *Cum Laude* distinction, signifying a cumulative GPA of 3.5 to 3.749; 8 received *Magna Cum Laude* distinction, signifying a cumulative GPA of 3.75 to 3.899; and 2 students received *Summa Cum Laude* distinction, carrying a cumulative GPA of 3.9 to 4.0. ACADEMIC REORGANIZATION

An RME (Reasonable and Moderate Extension) proposal was developed by the Provost's Office to rename the College of Applied Sciences and Arts (CASA) to the College of Health and Human Sciences (CHHS). The RME will also administratively transfer the School of Health Sciences, the School of Psychology and Behavior Sciences, the School of Justice and Public Safety, and the School of Human Sciences to the CHHS. A separate proposed RME is under development to merge the Automotive Technology, Aviation Flight, Aviation Management, and Aviation Technologies Departments into a School of Transportation, and eventually move the school into a college that is better aligned with the academic disciplines of the school. In addition, a separate proposed RME is under development to move the School of Architecture into a college that is better aligned with the academic disciplines of the school. Keeping them in place during this phase of the re-organization permits SIUC to move ahead with the marketing of the new college and schools in a cohesive and timely matter.

Renaming the College of Applied Sciences and Arts to the College of Health and Human Sciences strategically repositions the College and provides an opportunity to highlight programs in health and human science related fields. This will attract students and faculty to work in an environment that promotes collaboration in curriculum, outreach, and research.

Very soon, the college name will be changed; the college home for many programs will be changed; and many other changes are expected to occur after 1/1/2020. But our growth spirit will not change; our cando attitude will not change; our tradition of excellence will not change; our dedication to success will not change; and our passion for student success will not change. We will bring the CASA tradition and CASA growth spirit to our new academic homes. We will continue to help our students in their academic lives and professional lives.

As we conclude the semester and the calendar year, we proudly reminisce about the accomplishments of students, faculty, and staff in the College of Applied Sciences and Arts. I have enjoyed sharing the news with you through this newsletter. Thank you for all your support and effort in making CASA the most extraordinary college in SIU. May this joyous season bring you light, peace and happiness now and throughout the New Year ahead.
